


8 Books Involving An Individuals' Transformation


2. Introducing Teddy(+4): By Jessica Walton, Illustrated by Dougal MacPherson







4. I am Not a Girl (5+): By Jessica Verdi and Maddox Lyons, Illustrated by Dana Simpson





6. Red: a Crayon Story (5+): Michael Hall
