



2. They, He, She: Words for you and me: By Mudpuppy, Illustrated by Andy Passchier





4. Grandads Pride: By Harry Woodgate





6. The Frog's Kiss: By Toto Martinez and James Mayhew (description is taken from Scholastic world shop UK)


8. Not He or She I'm Me: By A.M Wild, Illustrated by Kah Yangni (Description from Words Worth Books Catalogue)
